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EU Minor Uses Coordination Facility (MUCF)



Because of the extensive data packages required for authorization to market plant protection products, growers face increasing difficulties in gaining authorization for "minor uses". Minor uses of pesticides are uses on niche crops with a high economic value for farmers, but usually of low economic interest for the agro-pesticide industry. This leads to a lack of authorized products on the market for farmers to use on these crops which in turn can lead to illegal uses or to loss of crop production. These crops include most vegetables, fruit, nurseries, flowers, forest trees and some arable crops. It is estimated that overall they represent more than \notin 70 billion per year, which equates to 22% of the total EU plant production value.

Participation of experts in Commodity Expert Groups (CEGs) and the Horizontal Expert Group (HEG)

The EU Minor Uses Coordination Facility should develop clear rules on the composition of and the number of attendees in the Expert Groups.

Approved by the Steering Group on 22 November 2017

Clear Rules for Membership of Expert Groups

- **Expertise** (according to Terms of Reference)
- Active and constructive participation in the meetings
- Providing agenda items and supporting documents
- Adding relevant information to EUMUDA
- Acting as a project leader
- Participating in projects with other Member States
- Responding to requests from the MUCF (e.g. survey)

Establishment of a New Commodity Expert Group

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EUROPEAN UNION MINOR USES COORDINATION FACILITY

Final - Rev. 1

Procedure and criteria how to start a new Commodity Expert Group

The term "Commodity Expert Group" refers to a platform to close in a joint effort minor use gaps at EU level by finding chemical or non-chemical solutions within an Integrated Pest Management (IPM) framework. The Commodity Expert Group consists of national minor use experts and representatives of the respective growers' associations or grower groups.

Approved by the Steering Group on 22 November 2017

Establishment of a New Commodity Expert Group

In general, when a certain number of Member States and growers' associations representing a substantial percentage of the EU-production of that commodity are willing to comply with the Terms of Reference of a CEG it should be possible to start a new CEG.

Guidance Document

Guidance Document for applicants (industry as well as growers associations) on registration issues for minor uses.

- Compact overview on all registration issues and focus on interpretation of data requirements, data protection, data ownership, confidential data, zonal procedure, mutual recognition.
 - Part 1: minor use need -> generating data Part 2: application process -> solution

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Long-term funding

- The funding of the Coordination Facility was guaranteed for the first three years (until April 2018)
- EUMUCF was jointly funded by the European Union and the governments of France, Germany and the Netherlands
- The total eligible costs were estimated at EUR 700 000 per year



Long-term funding

- It is clear that minor uses problems will not all be resolved in three years
- A mid-/long-term planning (5-10 years) and a strategy how other Member States can contribute, has been prepared
- A letter from the European Commission has been sent to Permanent Representations of the EU Member States (September 2017)
- Discussion in the AGRI-FISH Council meeting on 9 October 2017
- Member States have been approached with a request for a voluntary assessed contribution (November 2017)

- It must be emphasized that only with the indicated voluntary assessed contributions the continuity of the Coordination Facility can be guaranteed.
- In other scenarios there will be an effect on staffing, EUMUDA and/or reimbursement of expenses for Expert Groups.

Current Financial Situation

Financial situation 2018

- Grant agreement applicable until mid-April 2018
- Contributions and Commitments received from: AT, BE, CH, DE, DK, FI, FR, IE, IT, LT, LV, NL, SE, SK
- ▶ The amount not spent in the first two years (EUR 150 000)
- Total amount currently available for the period mid April - end 2018: EUR 450 000

Financial situation 2019

- Commitments : EUR 165 000
- ▶ The amount not spent in the third year (EUR 50 000)
- In the case the budget is less than EUR 350 000 the MUCF will not be able to maintain existing staffing levels



Minor Uses Steering Group

- DG AGRI has been approached with a request for funding
- Explore the possibility of funding of the Coordination Facility via EPPO-contributions
- Work towards long(er) commitments and financial agreements with Member States for several years
- Funders will take part in governance of the Coordination Facility.
- Arrangements will be discussed for a steering group to be appointed by the whole body of funders

Involvement MUCF in REFIT

- 1st Stakeholder meeting (12 September 2017)
- Online survey for stakeholders (December 2017)
- Focus Group on the authorisation of Plant Protection Products (5 March 2018)
- 2nd Stakeholder meeting (16 May 2018)

Input MUCF in REFIT Stakeholder Survey

- A harmonized EU-wide definition (instead of national definitions) would facilitate the zonal process.
- Member States should move away from asking 'national specific requirements'.
- The use of residue data generated outside the EU should be supported.
- MRL applications should be maximally extrapolated for minor uses.
- Availability of low risk products is insufficient.
- Etc.

Draft Report Consultant

- The availability of PPPs for minor uses is negatively affected by a lack of clarity regarding the rules for authorisation and of harmonisation between MS.
- The definition of minor uses is not sufficiently clear. Procedures are often not clearly established
- Competent Authorities and stakeholders welcome the establishment of the Coordination Facility (MUCF)
- Improve acceptance of data on residue trials generated outside the EU (when GAPs and GLPs are comparable) and extrapolations.

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What we plan to do next (I)

Guarantee sustainable long-term funding of the Minor Uses Coordination Facility

Expert Groups

- Continue to provide administrative and technical support to the Expert Groups in organising meetings and managing ongoing projects
- Increase participation at meetings and in projects from more countries
- Organise plenary sessions with topics of general interest (e.g. residues)
- Develop work plans for the individual Commodity Expert Groups
- Review the participation of experts to Expert Groups
- Develop IPM solutions for minor use needs

What we plan to do next (II)

EU-level

- Encourage the removal of national specific requirements for minor use applications
- Maintain and reinforce the link with the EU database PPPAMS
- Create a level playing field for EU growers of speciality crops
- Meet some of the largest Member States (e.g. ES, PL)

International level

- Continue to cooperate with global minor uses programmes to stimulate international harmonisation
- Play an active role in the OECD Expert Group on Minor Uses (EGMU)

What we plan to do next (III)

Long(er) term

- Explore whether the EUMUDA database could also eventually host the Global Minor Uses Database
- Introduce national projects from all Member States in EUMUDA
- Organise EU priority setting meetings at an annual basis
- Explore the possibility to create an EU fund for minor uses
