1. The IPPC and the National Reporting Obligations (NROs)

Purpose

The purpose of the Convention is "international cooperation in controlling pests of plants and plant products and in preventing their international spread, and especially their introduction into endangered areas" (Preamble)

"Each contracting party shall assume responsibility, without prejudice to obligations under other international agreements, for the fulfilment within its territories of all requirements under this Convention" (Art. 1.2)



The reason for having NROs is to ensure that a minimum amount of official phytosanitary information is available for ensuring safe trade, safeguarding food security and protecting the environment from plant pests

13 NROs: 7 public and 6 bilateral



3. Designation of an Official IPPC Contact Point (OCP)

The <u>key roles of OCPs</u> for **information exchange** under the IPPC between CPs, CPs & IPPC Secretariat and CPs and RPPOs

Have the necessary authority and adequate resources

Ensure information exchange in a timely manner

Redirect information to appropriate official(s)

Redirect requests to appropriate official(s)

Keep track of appropriate responses to information requests

It is of utmost importance to have correct name and coordinates of the Official IPPC Contact Points on the IPP





4.1 Pest reports – Art. IV 2(b) & VIII 1(a) of the IPPC

- Art. IV 2(b) & VIII 1(a): surveillance and pest reporting under NPPOs responsibility
- Art. IV 2(b): surveillance of growing plants and plants and plant products in storage or in transportation with the object of reporting
- Art. VIII 1(a): exchange of information = reporting via the International Phytosanitary Portal (IPP) the occurrence, outbreak or spread of pests that may be of immediate or potential danger

4.2 Pest reports – Responsibilities and situations to report

- ISPM 17 Pest reporting: describes the responsibilities of and requirements for contracting parties in reporting the occurrence, outbreak and spread of pests ... and also successful eradication of pests and establishment of pest free areas
- Three types of situation to report:
 - Immediate or potential danger
 - Changed status, absence or correction of earlier reports
 - Pests in imported consignments








4.3 Pest reports – What?

- Date of the report
- Identity of the pest with scientific name
- Host(s) or articles concerned
- Status of the pest under <u>ISPM 8</u>
- Geographical distribution
- Nature of immediate or potential danger
- Person who can be contacted
- May indicate phytosanitary measures applied or required







4.4 Pest reports – How?

- Reports should be provided without undue delay
- NPPOs are encouraged to use electronic means = fast communication:
 - E-mail to OCPs
 - Official national website
 - International Phytosanitary Portal (IPP)
- Good to know! Not all fields in the pest reporting form on the IPP are obligatory to complete in order to technically submit the report to the Portal
- May also address pest reports to RPPOs or privately contracted reporting system



4.6 Pest reports on the IPP by country





Countries

The IPPC is an international treaty that applies to most nations involved with international trade in any commodity that could introduce a new plant pest into a new area; in other words, it is applicable to all trans-boundary movements of plants and plant products.

Countries

It is in the interest of all nations to be contracting parties to the Convention: membership means they can play an active part in developing international standards that help to protect their exported and imported goods.

Exchanging technical and official phytosanitary information is vital to the Convention's effective implementation. The IPPC Web site — the IPP — acts as a forum for information exchange, and parties and the IPPC Secretariat use it to meet IPPC reporting obligations by publishing documents or providing links to outside Web pages.

The Convention identifies certain types of information countries are required to report to other contracting parties, to the IPPC Secretariat and/or to RPPOs:

- IPPC Official Contact Points (Art. VIII.2)
- Official pest report (Ar. VIII.1a)
- Description of the NPPO (Art. IV.4)
- Phytosanitary Restrictions/Legislation (Art. VII.2b)

Home About Standards Commission Committees

- Entry points (Art. VII.2d)
- List of regulated pests (Art. VII.2i)
- Emergency actions (Art. VII.6)


