

Overview of E-Commerce Trade in Ireland

Over 40% of Irish enterprises now have e-commerce sales, a trend accelerated by the pandemic

Revenue <u>over €5 billion</u> in 2024, expected to exceed 8 Billion by 2029.

User penetration has exceeded 50%, meaning just over half of customers in Ireland have begun shopping online.

Overview of E-Commerce Trade in Ireland

Quantity of parcels delivered by the seven operators was **140millio**n in 2022.

42 million e-commerce parcels were sent to Ireland from abroad in 2023. (Com Reg)

84% of Irish online consumers have shopped internationally. International retailers, including Amazon, remain dominant

Ireland has one of the highest online shopping rates in Europe, with 96% of internet users making digital purchases in 2024.

why people use online marketplaces when shopping for physical goods. According to a <u>recent survey</u>, **convenience is the most important factor**. This was listed by almost three-quarters (72%) of respondents, alongside saving time (64%) and saving money with more competitive pricing (52%).

Public has become accustomed to buying plants on line, many Irish garden centres operate both a physical store and an e-commerce platform. This "click and collect" option, offered by some retailers, provides flexibility for customers.


Niche products: Specialised retailers are emerging to meet niche demands, such as mature specimen trees or native flora, which might not be available at larger, generalist garden centres.

E- commerce Hubs


 12 locations -primarily around major entry points.

Building relationships in the supply chain

- Engagement with major online platform
- Sharing of intel and introduction of rules by the online platform based on product codes, keywords and redirect purchases source within the EU

Ongoing Challenges





Collaboration with Customs

- Engagement and collaboration is essential in the delivery of controls
- In late 2021-2022 collaborated on parcels declared as clothing coming from Hong Kong.
- Approx 50 consignment's intercepted containing hundreds of succulent plants
- In July/Oct of 2025 engaged on postal consignments coming from China
- interception of 26 packages unsolicited seeds

s with every industry, the trade of plants over the internet has increased exponentially over the last number of years. However, there are a few things to be aware of when buying or selling plants online.

Plant Passports



All plants traded online are

certificate (PC). A PC is a legal document issued by the National Plant Protection Organisation (NPPO) of the country of origin. It certifies that the plants are free from certain harmful quarantine pests and diseases. Always check with the exporter that the plants or plant products you are buying will be accompanied by a PC. If not, they will be refused entry

when they arrive at the border control post and either returned to origin or destroyed. Examples of regulated plant products commonly bought online that need to be accompanied

by a PC are grass seed, flower seed and bulbs cut flowers and

you must be registered with DAFM as an importer. The Plant Health Division at DAFM can assist you with more information on the documentation and procedures required.

If you wish to export plants or plant products outside the EU. you will need to obtain a PC from DAFM which is the NPPO for Ireland. This can be done online, and you do not need to be registered with DAFM to do so. You should apply for a PC at least two weeks prior to the date of export to allow sufficient time for inspection and sampling, if required. There may be certain lab tests required depending on what plants you are exporting and what country they are being exported to. When the inspection is complete and any required test results have come back clear, you will be issued with a PC.

DISEASES OUT OF THE EUROPEAN UNION







You are NOT allowed to bring plants, fruit*, vegetables, flowers or seeds into the European Union without a phytosanitary certificate**.

* Bananas, coconuts, dates, pineapples and durians can be brought into the EU without a certificate

^{**} You do not need a certificate when the plants, fruit, vegetables, flowers or seeds come from Liechtenstein, Switzerland or the United Kingdom (only Nothern Ireland).




** You will need a certificate when they come from the following EU territories: Ceuta, Melilla, the Canary Islands, Guadeloupe, French Guiana, Martinique, Mayotte, Réunion, Saint Barthélemy and Saint Martin.
